MEMORANDUMS and  
OBSERVATIONS.

16 lb of flax gives 2 hanks  
1 hank gives 12 wts. (more I suppose  
according to the fineness of the flax)  
2 wts makes a yard of  $\frac{3}{4}$  linen  
2 wts more must be added for  
the birds eyes on the rising table  
at the press.

Half a pound of flax to the  
end of common  $\frac{3}{4}$  linen  
at top of the loom - 8 or 9  
steps out of 12 wts to a hank
